Weight should be given in all cases when it is likely to afford evidence of the progress of the disability.

The wound is healed. There is a fair amount of Callus with 1/4 in of shortening. There is very slight movement in the ankle joint. Pt has been on massage and electrical treatment since Oct 24th 1916. There has however been no improvement in the movement of the ankle joint. The patient's general condition is good.
